### Strengthening the Enabling Environment for Civil Society and Media Organizations in Nepal

### Policy dialogue between Social Welfare Council (SWC) and CSOs

GoGo Foundation organized an interaction program with the board members and staff of SWC on January 25, 2018 at the premises of the Social Welfare Council (SWC) in Kathmandu. Kedar Khadka, Executive Director of GoGo Foundation, presented the Landscape Report on CSOs to highlight gaps in policy reform, and operational challenges facing CSOs. Nirmal Baral, the Vice-chair of SWC, said SWC was constituted to facilitate and coordinate work among CSOs. He stressed on the need for dialogue between SWC and CSOs to resolve policy issues and problems facing CSOs. Bir Bahadur Thagunna, Treasurer of SWC, talked about the increasing communication gap between CSOs and SWC. "CSOs should approach"

SWC to talk about their differences and grievances on issues related to existing guidelines and directives", he



said. Shiva Kumar Basnet, Acting Director of SWC, expressed commitment on SWC's readiness to discuss draft laws and challenges with wider civil society, admitting this was not a practice in the past. SWC officials and board members collectively highlighted the need for strengthening collaboration and cooperation between CSOs and SWC in days ahead. Out of 21 participants, 3 were female.

### Expert dialogue on 'National Assembly Election: Representation Framework'

National Election Observation Committee (NEOC) organized an expert dialogue on 'National Assembly Election: Representation Framework' on January 25, 2018 in Kathmandu. Various organizations and stakeholders concerned with electoral assistance, monitoring, communication and reform in Nepal, critically assessed the National Assembly election procedure. Discussions revolved around the complexity associated with the single transferable vote

(STV) system, coupled with different weightage rendered to provincial assembly members and chiefs & deputy chiefs of the local federal units. The participants urged the Election Commission of Nepal to simplify the vote counting process and make use of technology wherever possible. Presentations made by NEOC and IFES discussed the need for representation of people with disability, marginalized communities, women and *Dalit* at the National Assembly.

Participants discussed the need for electoral

members to be nominated by the President. The

discussion also identified several areas for advocacy and reform to make future elections more credible. Forty-two participants (10 female) including former Chief Election Commissioners Mr. Surya Prasad Shrestha and Nilkantha Uprety, graciously attended and offered their opinions. Representatives of several domestic election observation groups advocated for the need for close observation and study of the upcoming National Assembly election.

### Sharing 'GESI checklist' and 'GESI analysis of the journalist code of conduct' with deputy mayors of Kathmandu district

On January 23, 2018, Samjhauta Nepal and Media Advocacy Group (MAG) brought together five Deputy Mayors from Kathmandu district including, Renu Rai (Budhanilkantha), Bindu Simkhada (Kageshwori Manahara), Sukra Laxmi Shrestha (Shankarapur), Bhanu Dotel (Tarakeshwor) and Sushila Adhikari (Nagarjun) to take part in a dialogue with a loose network of media organizations, representatives and journalists. One of the core objectives of this program was to share a Gender Equality and Social Inclusion (GESI) checklist developed by CS:MAP with the Deputy Mayors, as a possible tool for assessing the development and implementation of policies with a GESI lens. While Babita



Basnet, president of MAG, presented the GESI checklist to the Deputy Mayors, Dr. Mahendra Bista, former president of the Federation of Nepali Journalists, presented the analysis of Nepal's Journalist Code of Conduct 2016 from a GESI perspective. Bindu Simkhada shed light on the kind of challenges they faced as Deputy Mayors and how this hindered the effective execution of their roles. Media portrayal of newly elected leaders as not doing much towards the advancement of public interest while only taking interest in perks and facilities was not right and conveyed a wrong message, she added. The event was broadcast by Nepal Television and *Janta* TV and also covered by the *Nagarik* daily.

### Civil society and media engagement with government on public services delivery and resource use

Thirteen Common Assembly meetings were held this month in Kathmandu, Gorkha, Okhaldhunga, Ramechhap, Sindhuli, Bhaktapur, Lalitpur, Nuwakot, Rasuwa, Dhading, Makwanpur, Rukum and Gulmi districts. These meetings are held on a periodic basis and are organized by local civil society groups with the aim of providing citizens and civic groups a platform for engaging with their local government on improving public service delivery in health, education, agriculture and disaster recovery and reconstruction. Additionally, CS:MAP CSO partners conducted social accountability trainings for local stakeholders with the support from Intermediary Service Organizations (ISOs), in Gulmi, Palpa and Kapilvastu districts. RWDC used the Community Scorecard tool to

assess services offered by a local health post in Dang. Four *Shreejanshil Shakhas* were established in Dhading, Makwanpur, Gorkha and Okhaldhunga districts. Listening, Discussion and Action Group (LDAG) meetings were held in all 34 program districts with 16 additional LDAGs being formed in January 2018.

### Shreejanshil Shakha: A step to innovation

Prakash Shreejanshil Shakha hosted by Prakash Youth Club in Kapilvastu initiated its new chapter with the support from IRDC. A computer set and basic

its work in increasing youth engagement in improved service delivery. public Vice chairperson Vijaynagar Gaunpalika, Laxmi Chaudhary expressed her commitment to support such initiations future, while inaugurating the Shakha. The Shakha will be used as a center for information exchange, civic education

and dialogue, particularly around public service delivery and policy reform issues. IRDC will provide necessary support to document discussions around public interest. The *Shakha* has prepared a code of conduct for visitors and has started to document visitors' information in a systematic manner.

The Shreejanshil Shakha in Kailali district is being used as a common space for local level interactions for the district. FMDC conducted a coordination meeting with

CSOs, elected representatives and media from the Gauriganga municipality at the *Shakha*. The discussion focused on priorities of the Municipality, social and development issues, people's expectations and municipality's efforts to scale up development efforts in meeting peoples' expectations. The elected representatives of Gauriganga Wards 9 and 11, including Ward Chair Hari Prasad Tiwari, requested support from CSOs to develop and implement local level policies and guidelines.

### Policy Corner established in CDC, Nuwakot

CDC Nepal has established a policy corner in its office in Nuwakot from January 2018. CDC Nepal had planned to establish this corner as an outcome of the

as updated policies of the organization. While increased employees now have access organizational policies and guidelines, even visitors are coming in to understand the functioning of the organization. This has helped CDC Nepal in enhancing staff reading habits and in enhancing the internal governance of organization. CDC also takes this as a good opportunity to solicit feedback on policies from the team and to review accordingly. Besides the organization policies, CDC Nepal is also collecting newly drafted and updated government policies and procedures (especially on Health, Education, DRR and Agriculture as well new Local Government Operation Act 2074).

### Social Accountability tools and citizen's access to governance

Mayor of Ghorahi sub-metropolitan city, Narulal Chaudhary, decided to develop *Rampur Health Post* as an urban health management center. The health post now has a full-time doctor with laboratory facility for pathology tests and medicines. From December 27 to 29, RWDC, with the support from NNSWA, used the Community Scorecard, a social accountability tool to assess staff behavior, status of medicine distribution, transparency of accounting system and visibility of various equipment. Involving the participation of the health post management committee, health post staff, community people, common assembly members and elected



representatives of Ward 2, the exercise aims to resolve issues/problems identified during the process and improve

transparency and accountability at the health post. The improvement plan that resulted from the process, identified the need for a public campaign to make people aware of available services; sought management commitment to make 35 types of medicines available; provide regular pre-natal care services focused on all households in the Ward; provision of essential medical equipment; and conducting regular nutrition improvement campaigns. All 30 participants expressed their satisfaction over the use of the tool for effective public service delivery and oversight. Ward chairperson Keshab Acharya thanked RWDC for the support.

# RTI and CSO information desk in provincial trade fair – Nepalgunj

IHRC managed a CSO desk to provide information on the 'right to information' (RTI) at the provincial trade fair in Nepalgunj held from January 25 to February 05, 2018. IHRC negotiated for a free stall with FNCCI Banke, and



coordinated with the NGO Federation and other CS:MAP partners, including HRPLSC, to display and distribute their available resources on RTI from the stall. An estimated 1,500 visitors come to the fair every day and IHRC has planned to provide RTI and other information material to about 1,000 people during the fair. RTI application forms have also been made available to the visitors and volunteers trained on RTI and IHRC personnel have been providing information to the stall visitors. In addition to the information, IHRC will provide need-based support to the visitors to file RTI.

### **PPWG**s active in having third party monitoring mechanism in the district

A Public Private Working Group (PPWG) meeting facilitated by HRPLSC in Rolpa, focused on having third-party monitoring committees for effective public service delivery and public resource use at the local levels. The meeting chaired by the District Coordination Committee chief, decided to request all local units of Rolpa to form third party monitoring committees and carry out different activities as provisioned in the Local Government Operation Act - 2074, for strengthening governance in the district. Fourteen members of the PPWG. including representatives from the private sector, civil society and media, discussed on the need and process for the formation of the monitoring committees. mandatory placement of citizen charters in public offices, deputation of information officers, and conducting public hearings on a regular basis.

### Civil Society and media interact to discuss on their roles in the changed context

This month, a total of nine interactions were held in an effort to revive the discourse on CSOs roles in the



changing context.
In this connection,
HURADEC Nepal
conducted an
interaction
program among
civil society,
media, newly
elected people's

representatives and other relevant stakeholders, on December 28, 2017 in Charikot, Dolakha district. Among the 28 participants, former Chairperson of Nepal Bar Association Krishna Bahadur Basnet presented a concept paper on the role of civil society in the changed context. The interaction helped district stakeholders to come together into a common forum on issues of common interest. HURADEC vice chairperson Uddav Prasad Pokharel chaired this

meeting where the vice chairperson of the Dolakha District Coordination Committee (DCC), Manmaya Jirel was chief guest. The chief guest focused on the importance of such events during development of new policies at the local level. She added that civil society should play an active role and carry out effective oversight in strengthening governance. She also requested HURADEC to organize similar interaction programs on a regular basis.

On January 10, 2018, DEC Nepal organized an

interaction program in Makwanpur district on the "Role of CSOs in the changed context" in collaboration with NGO Federation, Federation of Nepali Journalists and



South Asia Partnership Nepal. **DCC** chairperson Raghunath Khulal and vice chairperson Bhagwati Pudasaini were the special auests at this program attended by 53 participants. The

discussion was led by two papers presented by Bol Bahadur Karki from the NGO Federation and Pratap Bista from the Federation of Nepali Journalists. The papers revolved around CSO and media contribution to balanced development and promoting right to information. The DCC chair asserted that CSOs can play a stronger role as development partners and he assured that the government will provide necessary support for creating an enabling environment for CSOs.


The DCC vice chair proudly announced that she has declared her personal assets as required of an elected public official, and expressed her commitment for providing continuous in support increasing coordination amongst different CSO stakeholders. The USAID Democracy and Governance Specialist, Krishna Pathak, stressed on the need for CSOs to partner with local governments in curbing corruption. The interaction concluded with renewed а commitment to work for increased representation of marginalized communities in policy and plan formation; provide district level policy recommendations for CSO oversight after wider consultations: CSO partnership with municipalities in five-year plan formulation; provide continuity to campaigns to curb corruption; to support elected public officials to make their assets public; and develop common understanding on indicators of internal good governance for CSOs and their adoption and implementation.

### Capacity building of CSOs and media

Twenty-eight CS:MAP district coordinators and community facilitators learned about facilitation skills in a training provided by NEPAN. Additionally, 34 district coordinators also gained knowledge on advocacy strategy which will help them in finalizing district level cross sectoral advocacy issues. The knowledge imparted by Kathmandu Living Labs on the use of ICT tools, is an added tool for CSOs to work on enhancing governance at the local level. CS:MAP ISO, *MITRA Samaj*, also trained district coordinators on how to develop strong personnel and financial policies. NNSWA conducted a 4-days workshop with IHRC in Banke and RWDC in Dang to review and revise their personnel and financial policies.

### Workshop on advocacy strategy planning for Civil Society Organizations

NEPAN organized two workshops on 'Advocacy Strategy Planning," from January 1-2, 2018 in Kathmandu and January 18-19, 2018 in Nepalgunj. Thirty-three CS:MAP district coordinators participated in these two-day workshops that aimed to inform and update participants on the steps involved in an advocacy cycle and in its design, implementation and assessment. Participants identified advocacy issues related to the health, education, agriculture and disaster risk reduction sectors and then used the problem analysis tree to analyze these issues. They



then prepared a detailed strategy and plan to which resource person Bhola Bhattarai provided feedback. At the end of the workshop, participants made commitments to finalize the plan and validate the issues by sharing it with district coalition and common assembly members, as well as concerned community members.

### **Facilitation skills training for Civil Society Organizations (CSOs)**

NEPAN organized two training sessions on 'Facilitation Skills" for 50 participants from the 14 CS:MAP CSO partners. These two-day events (December 30-31, 2017 and January 16-17, 2018) were organized in Lalitpur and in Nepalgunj respectively. The fifty facilitators from 34 districts were capacitated on the fundamentals of facilitation (including basic concepts such as teaching, training, facilitation, mediation, negotiation, etc.); foundations of facilitation using the

appreciative inquiry concept; handling group dynamics in facilitation; and facilitative listening skills. Techniques such as learning contract, river of life, four-face tool, speed dating, fears and hopes were discussed using



illustrative talk, short demonstrations, discussion and presentations. Short practical sessions to facilitate meeting; using brainstorming and role play; facilitating public consultation/group discussion etc. performed as simulated exercises. At the end of the training, the added learning was documented by using a 7-step ladder tool. What participants will do after this training as a part of way forward was documented. The participants found the training useful for enhancement of their knowledge related to facilitation, and highly appreciated the practical and contextual sessions.

### Policy review and update workshop

In a bid to increase knowledge of standard provisions and procedures on personnel and financial policies among executive leaders of CS:MAP partner CSOs, and support them in standardizing, reviewing and updating the policies of their respective organizations, MITRA Samaj conducted a three-day 'Policy Review and Update Workshop' in Kathmandu from January 10 to 12, 2018. Twenty-six participants from 14 CSOs participated in this workshop. The



purpose of the workshop was to address the gaps in policies of CSOs identified during policy review conducted by FHI 360 along with the findings of Organizational Capacity Assessments. By discussing identified gaps in existing personnel and financial policies and provisions, the workshop provided a way forward for all CSOs to revise these instruments. During the workshop, a standard sample policy frame was also provided. Developing action plans was one of the major agendas during the workshop to revise each CSO's policies. Each CSO fixed their deadline to revise their policy and three ISOs - MITRA Samaj, NEPAN and NNSWA will provide necessary support.

### **USAID** and **CS:MAP** Joint Field Visit

CS:MAP team members conducted a joint visit to 12 districts: Banke, Surkhet, Dang, Rukum, Salyan, Pyuthan, Rolpa, Gulmi, Arghakhanchi, Makwanpur, Nuwakot and Rasuwa districts, between December 27, 2017-January 23, 2018. The field visits focused on:

providing technical inputs to local **CSOs** on strengthening civil society in the districts and use of



social accountability tools, monitoring field activities of CS:MAP partners and learn good practices, interact with government and civil society stakeholders about the CS:MAP work, interact with civil society on their views about the roles of civil society in the changed context and learn about the functioning of sectoral service providing line agencies and issues around functioning of local government. The interactions held in the district

> headquarters helped to re-invigorate a vibrant discussion on the role of civil society in democratic governance, both to critically oversee government's role and engage with government constructively.
